During the Information stage, fantasy owners compile information about players at individual positions. Process involves comparison of players across all of the positions.

We put a tremendous amount of hard work into our draft board, and you do as well. As such, you need to trust the fruits of these labors and adhere to your draft board as much as possible. The surest way to be able to extract maximum value is to prepare extensively ahead of time and then refrain from jumping around on the board on Draft Day. Approach the draft with an actuarial mindset, determined to squeeze maximum value out of every pick, and you will be poised for success.

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Draft Board Decoder

The FantasyDrafthelp.com draft board contains all the relevant information you need right at your fingertips. For example, in terms of QB, RB, WR and TE:

^ Players are color-coded by their value by round in a 12-team draft. 1st round is gold, 2nd round silver, 3rd round bronze, 4th round orange and 5th round light blue.

^ \$ denotes the dollar value in auction leagues.

^ The "Exp" column displays where each player placed in an "experts consensus board" of top fantasy magazines and websites.

^ The "Stat" column shows how each player performed on our standard deviation from the mean statistic in 2024 (stat details on Page 4).

^ 2024 yardage and TD totals are listed, along with rankings for each and rankings in the aforementioned "Stat" category. Also, on the WR and TE boards, "Catch%" measures the completion percentage of targets to each player. Rushing yards for quarterbacks and receiving yards for running backs are also listed.

^ "Bye" denotes each player's bye week.

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FantasyDrafthelp.com Suggested League Guidelines

Many leagues start 1 QB, 2 RB, 2 WR, 1 TE, 1 K and some D/ST combination. Some leagues allow the TE position to be WR or TE (in which case, only a few TEs merit any consideration) and some have a "flex" position, which is generally 1 additional RB or WR. With leagues who utilize defense, some deploy a team D/ST unit and some use individual D players.

The most common scoring system is a variation of the following: 4 points per passing TD, 1 point per 25 yards passing, 1 point per passing 2-point PAT, 6 points per receiving or rushing TD, 1 point per 10 yards rushing or receiving, 2 points per rushing or receiving 2-point PAT, 2 points per "big play touchdown" (50 or more yards), 1 point per kicking PAT, 3 points per FG, with a 1-point bonus at 45 yards, a 2-point bonus at 50 yards and a 3-point bonus at 55 yards, 6 points per defensive or special teams TD, 1 point per interception, sack or fumble recovered and 2 points per safety. In leagues that award 6 points for passing TDs, QBs are worth much more.

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Evaluating Production Across a Spectrum: Lessons of "The Stat"

Our "Stat" category on our draft board calculates the standard deviation from the mean in all statistical categories.

In simple English, imagine a spectrum going across from left to right, with negative numbers on the left side, a "zero" in the middle and positive numbers on the right side. We utilize this statistic for baseball, basketball, hockey and NASCAR as well as football. A player's performance in each category is plotted on one of these spectrums, with the most valuable players putting up most of their numbers on the most of their numbers on the positive side. Then, we add up the totals of every category, positive and negative. By using this tool, we can identify not merely how they performed, but how valuable their performances were in each category. Truly, this statistic serves as the ultimate baseline for the previous season's production.

Don't Be That Guy

^ Don't be that guy who is unprepared and whines in the mid to late rounds that everyone worth taking is already gone. They're not; you're just unprepared.

^ Don't be that guy who doesn't properly understand your league's scoring system. League setups are like snowflakes; no two are the same. Our draft board is configured to conform to a fairly basic scoring system, but your league could have some quirks that would force you to make adaptations to our board. Be aware.

^ Don't be that guy who doesn't pay enough attention and selects players who are already off the board. It's impolite to your leaguemates and it will invariably break your concentration when everyone howls at you and you've got to go back to Square One on a backup pick. To ensure that you are aware of everything that is going on during your draft, utilize a "grid" to track all teams, with the number of rounds going down the left side and the teams listed along the top.

^ Don't be that guy who approaches the draft like it's a night of epic decision-making. If you've done your homework, it's not. You merely find out where you're drafting and you "let the draft come to you."

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2025 Fantasy Overview

^ The top tier at RB is a bit deeper than in 2024, with the second tier about at the same place and the third tier narrower. The fourth tier is deeper, with the fifth tier a bit shallower. Nevertheless, our advice from 2024 remains constant: try to pick up two running backs in the first three rounds, lest you get shut out. Now, this is all things being equal, so if RB is actually too picked-over by the third round, delay your second pick and double-down on backup value later. However, it's unlikely that this would be the case and with the far superior depth at WR, this approach should allow you to hit your targets at both positions. Moving forward, with RBs like Saquon Barkley demonstrating that the NFL has really undervalued the position and the vulnerability of two-high defenses to the run, the pendulum is swinging back to greater tailback depth in the next year or so – not even factoring in the potential of players such as Ashton Jeanty to bring back the bell cow to the league.

^ The first tier at WR is a bit deeper than in 2024, but the second tier – which was 20-deep in 202 – is still deep, but is not quite to that unprecedented level. While the third tier is about level with 2024, the fourth, fifth and six tiers are a bit narrower. So prioritizing RB early and WR depth late is a winning combo for this year.

^ The top two tiers at TE are slimmer than in 2024, with the third tier just about even. But the top two players, Brock Bowers and Trey McBride, are producing at the level of Travis Kelce and George Kittle in their prime and should be valued as such.

^ The top tier at QB is shorter than in 2024 and it's bisected, with mobile passers Lamar Jackson, Jayden Daniels and Josh Allen above the line, along with the second coming of Dan Marino, Joe Burrow. The second tier is also somewhat smaller, but the third tier goes down to an unprecedented 28! So if you find yourself playing catch-up at this position, strongly consider playing the numbers game and drafting four quarterbacks.

2026 NFL Draft Preview

The clear leader in the clubhouse to be the top pick in the 2026 NFL Draft is the test-tube baby himself, Arch Manning, Texas QB. But a few other passers are expected to go high also, including Garrett Nussmeier of LSU, Drew Allar of Penn State (notwithstanding their recent history for churning out NFL QB busts) and LaNorris Sellers of South Carolina. There's plenty of top edge talents, including TJ Parker and Peter Woods of Clemson, Keldric Faulk of Auburn, Suntarine Perkins of Mississippi, Harold Perkins of LSU, Mateo Uiagalelei of Oregon, Rueben Bain Jr of Miami and Anthony Hill Jr of Texas.

Such a crop requires a fleet of top OT talents to protect the quarterbacks and this class has a few: Francis Mauigoa of Miami, Kayden Proctor of Alabama, Austin Barber of Florida and Spencer Fano of Utah.

There's also a strong crop of defensive backs: S Caleb Downs of Ohio State, S Keon Sabb of Alabama, CB/S Javon Kilgore of South Carolina and CB Domani Jackson of Alabama.

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1 Cleveland: This one shouldn't be too controversial. The Deshaun Watson fiasco is just the cherry on the excrement sundae of decades mismanagement, from Modell to the Lerner to Haslam. It would be very unwise to expect the new taxpayer-funded domed monstrosity change the franchise's karma. While the NFL finally, belatedly, recognized the franchise as an eight-time world champion with the addition of the AAFL titles in recent months, the vast majority of people in Greater Cleveland weren't alive for the last NFL crown in 1964 – thus rendering this organization even more pitiful than the Toronto Maple Leafs, who raised many Stanley Cups once upon a time, but none since 1967.

2 New York Jets: Talk about a franchise that's lucky that Cleveland exists, because they'd be at the top of this sad heap otherwise (admittedly, that luck did not extend to the team's collapse in the 1986 AFC Divisional Playoff on the North Coast). But even though this team exists in the shadow of Big Blue, there's still no reason that a New York-based team should have a championship drought that exists going back to Super Bowl 3 – with no returns to the big game since then and only the most sporadic AFC Championship appearances.

3 Buffalo: You have to go back to the AFL days to find the team's championship glory and those four consecutive Super Bowl losses in the 1990s constitute one of the most infamous futility strings in all of sports history. Much like the two franchises ahead of them on this list, they are supported by many passionate fans who feel the weight of the absence of championship glory to be suffocating.

4 Dallas: This team shot up the rankings when their archrivals, Washington, made a miracle run to the NFC Championship Game and left the Cowboys (1996) as the franchise with the longest drought in Championship Sunday appearances with Chicago (2011) in second-place in this dubious category by a full 15 years! Almost always good-to-very-good, Dallas can't get over the hump to even CHALLENGE for a Super Bowl appearance thanks largely to cap mismanagement that results in a stars-and-scrubs approach to roster building.

5 Minnesota: The Vikings' 0-4 Super Bowl record is less memorable than Buffalo's, largely because it was compiled over close to a decade in the 1960s and 1970s, but a crazed fanbase feels the pressure nonetheless. Rarely terrible and rarely superlative, the Vikes have sometimes been below-average, sometimes been average and sometimes been above-average over the years, but rarely at the forefront of public attention such that the average fan would perceive the frustration of those in the Twin Cities – with the exception of 1998-99, a time in which Minnesota was poised to win it all but collapsed in the NFC Championship Game.

6 Detroit: Fans have been happier over the past few seasons, but the team underachieved in the playoffs last year when they were the NFC favorites, have never won a Super Bowl and haven't won an NFL Championship since 1957. Don't underestimate the angst.

7 Houston: This designation includes the weight that Texans fans feel from the Oilers never even making it to a Super Bowl and hadn't tasted championship glory since the opening two seasons of the AFL. The Texans have been up and down in the years since without getting particularly close to the top of the mountain, which extends that Oiler legacy across more than five decades.

8 LA Chargers: Like Houston and Buffalo, the Chargers have to look all the way back to the AFL years for championship glory. From Dan Fouts to Philip Rivers to Justin Herbert, they've had top-flight QB play over the past few decades (although they were hilariously led to their only Super Bowl appearance, a loss, by the much less heralded Stan Humphries!), but they've never been good enough to go all the way.

9 Atlanta: Their championship futility has been under the radar more than with many organizations, but the football-crazed fans feel it fully. Rarely has their suffering been at the forefront of public consciousness, but it certainly was in Super Bowl 51 when they blew a 28-3 lead to New England.

10 Arizona: Having moved from Chicago to St. Louis to the Phoenix area over their history, the Cardinals having a futility streak dating back to their 1947 NFL Championship is less famous fashion than other franchises, but it exists nonetheless.

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Top 10 NFL Players On The Spot In 2025

By Rick Morris/The FDH Lounge

1 Kansas City TE Travis Kelce: The effects of aging cannot be reversed. The effects of partying and conditioning can be reversed. If Mr. Swift's slowdown over the past two seasons is attributable to the latter factor, and it is addressed, then the Chiefs may well be the favorites for a fourth consecutive AFC Championship if they have back even 90% of arguably the best TE of all time. Without that dynamic, then even this Patrick Mahomes-led offense may just be very good, but not great.

2 Buffalo WR Keon Coleman: He may have been a bit harsh, albeit in an admirable way, in describing his rookie season as "trash," but the performance in 2025 does need to be more even in order to help the Bills finally break through to the Super Bowl. His YPC was elite (19.2), but his catch percentage of 50.9% needs work.

3 Houston C Juice Scruggs: Able to play either center or guard, Scruggs will need to play at a strong level to help shore up the team's questionable internal line situation.

4 LA Rams OTs Alaric Jackson and Rob Havenstein (tie): The bookends of the Ram offensive line both have injury questions heading into the season. With an aging Matthew Stafford behind center, considering that he wasn't exactly Mr. Mobility in his prime, it's no exaggeration to say that the franchise's entire season hinges on keeping their star passer upright.

5 Washington DE Dorian Armstrong: DC made the playoffs in 2024 without the expected pressure that Armstrong was expected to put on opposing passing games. Now that they're the hunted and not the hunter anymore, Armstrong needs to step up to help the team maintain their success.

6 Detroit CB Terrion Arnold: Pass interference penalties and other lapses marred Arnold's rookie season. On a team having to adjust to new coordinators on both sides of the ball, and dealing with not only a first-place schedule but residence in what has been the NFL's toughest division, Arnold's anticipated growth into a shutdown cover corner needs to happen sooner rather than later.

7 LA Chargers TE Will Dissly: On a team with good weapons at the other skill positions, the Chargers are going to need more than good run blocking and questionable hands from Dissly in order to have a decent chance of toppling KC.

8 Green Bay DT Kenny Clark: Suffering all year from a toe injury that he blamed on the turf in Brazil in the season opener, Clark didn't have the kind of impact that the Packers will need from him in 2025 if they are to be a legitimate Super Bowl contender.

9 Baltimore DT Travis Jones: At the end of his rookie deal, the Ravens need for Jones to take a big step forward at the same time that he is in position to secure his financial future.

10 Philadelphia CB Kelee Ringo: As the leader in the clubhouse for the spot formerly occupied so very well by Darius Slay, Ringo has the burden of ensuring that the Philly defense continues to have not a single weak spot on paper.

What An NCAA SuperLeague Would Resemble

As college football continues to evolve, speculation ensues about what a true SuperLeague would resemble. Some pundits foresee a merger between the SEC and Big 10 that leaves the rest of the teams behind and another, more formalized proposal, portrays a structure of 72 teams that includes relegation. What's likeliest is a scenario that's far more stripped down than either of these models. Because so much of the income that's accrued in the sport comes from a disproportionately small number of programs. The amount of greed that would drive a SuperLeague – and attract the venture capital money that could make it happen – would cause the elite of the Big 10 and SEC to not want to share that money with the likes of Northwestern and Vanderbilt. No, this would be a true mask-off moment. There would be no more than 20 teams involved, with a full 10 mega-games every Saturday across different networks and streamers:

NORTHEAST DIVISION: Ohio State, Michigan, Penn State, Notre Dame

SOUTHEAST DIVISION: Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, Tennessee

SOUTH DIVISION: Clemson, Florida, Florida State, Miami

SOUTH CENTRAL DIVISION: LSU, Oklahoma, Texas, Texas A&M

PACIFIC DIVISION: Oregon, UCLA, USC, Washington

You get five division winners with a playoff bye and the highest-ranked wild card. Four other wild cards are selected and they play in the first round, with the standard quarterfinals, semifinals and championship game to follow. The two lowest-ranked teams get relegated to the FBS. It's that simple.

FDH College Rankings & Team Draft Guidelines

On the draft board, the numbers in parentheses are taken from a poll consensus. Take 6 owners and conduct a 7-round standard draft. Points will be assigned at 4 intervals: when the first College Football Playoff poll is released, when the third poll is released, when the final poll is released on December 7 and when the final AP poll is released after the national title game. The first CFP poll accounts for 20% of the total score (with the exception of the bonus points, mentioned below), the third CFP poll accounts for 20% of the total score, the December 8 poll accounts for 20% of the total score and the final AP poll accounts for 40% of the total score.

For the first three polls, scoring is as follows: 1st place (50 points), 2nd place (45 points), 3rd place (43 points), 4th place (42 points), 5th place (41 points), 6th place (38 points), 7th place (37 points), 8th place (36 points), 9th place (35 points), 10th place (34 points), 11th place (30 points), 12th place (29 points), 13th place (28 points), 14th place (27 points), 15th place (26 points), 16th place (22 points), 17th place (21 points), 18th place (20 points), 19th place (19 points), 20th place (18 points), 21st place (13 points), 22nd place (12 points), 23rd place (11 points), 24th place (10 points), 25th place (9 points).

Points are doubled in the final poll, since it accounts for twice the point total of each of the three previous ones. Additional bonuses are awarded for the following accomplishments:

35 points for winning the National Championship Game, 20 points for winning the national semifinals, 25 points for a conference title (or piece of one, for conferences without a championship game), 15 points for winning a quarterfinal bowl game, 10 points for winning a first-round playoff game, 5 points for winning a non-playoff bowl game and 10 points for having the Heisman Trophy winner on one of your teams.

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One Run-On Sentence For Each AFC Team

AFC EAST

Buffalo: The team “re-Bill’d” on the fly in 2024, but got no further than in past years, but is ready to potentially go further if they have enough reliable explosiveness in the receiver corps.

New England: The stealth playoff contender that nobody sees coming, the Pats have rebuilt their roster from the ruins of the end of the Belichick era.

NY Jets: If Justin Fields can be salvaged, and that’s a good-sized “if,” then the Jets have a roster that’s more than capable of making a playoff run.

Miami: The continued deterioration of a “stars and scrubs” roster leaves Mike McDaniel unfairly exposed to job scrutiny when the front office should actually be on the clock, so if the FireChrisGrier.com domain is still available, you may want to jump on that.

AFC NORTH

Baltimore: If the team holds up in the trenches and the boatload of city miles don’t catch up to Derrick Henry, then this could be a breakthrough year in Baltimore.

Cincinnati: A defense that will continue to blow non-shootout games and a bad offensive line are holding back Joe Burrow and his wondrous wideouts from another Super Bowl run.

Cleveland: They say if you have two quarterbacks that you have none, which must mean that the Browns have a negative number of quarterbacks, along with a turnstile at left tackle, a lack of wideout depth notwithstanding significant resources in the position over the past few years and reliability issues in the secondary that flare up at the worst possible times.

Pittsburgh: The Steelers took their lack of urgency with the QB position to new lows in the offseason and have questions on the offensive line and secondary.

AFC SOUTH

Houston: If their team holds up in the trenches, then they are a very viable dark horse Super Bowl contender being slept on by everyone.

Tennessee: Don’t look now, but the Titans have filled a lot of holes and if the Texans suffer a wave of injuries that opens up the divisional title picture, then Tennessee could be right there.

Indianapolis: A bleak QB room invites questions as to whether this team is tanking to draft the nephew of their greatest passer – at least, the greatest of the Indy years.

Jacksonville: Even if Trevor Lawrence can still be salvaged and Travis Hunter can be a real difference-maker on both sides of the ball, Jacksonville’s roster still has way too many question marks.

AFC WEST

Kansas City: After a Super Bowl hangover season that nonetheless saw the team win ugly repeatedly and make it to within a game of an unprecedented Super Bowl threepeat, the air of inevitability is gone, which is bad for them, but so too is the rampant half-speed complacency of 2024, which is good for them.

LA Chargers: For the first time in recent memory, this is no longer a “stars and scrubs” team, which means that the high ceiling that pundits have mistakenly put on them for years is finally valid.

Las Vegas: We said that this team was a nightmare on both sides of the ball a year ago and we were right, which should make the following observation even more shocking: even quieter than New England’s rapid rebuild is this reconstruction, which is no mirage in the desert, but a legit playoff contender, with dangerous weapons on both sides of the ball.

Denver: Pundits who paint with a broad brush label teams like this as automatic regression candidates because of their rapid rise in 2024 and they may feel an entirely unjustified sense of vindication at season’s end because any slide from the Broncos will probably mostly be from being in the wrong place at the wrong time in what may now be football’s toughest division.

NFC EAST

Philadelphia: Howie Roseman caused some heart palpitations with necessary offseason tweaks, but the defending champs were basically intact positionally by the time it was all over.

Washington: If the team can hold up defensively, then they are poised for another strong playoff run.

Dallas: In a league where teams have done a marginally better job of filling their holes on average each of the last several seasons, staying a "stars and scrubs" franchise means that you're moving backwards, which is quite fitting for the NFC's new standard of futility, with a Super Bowl appearance drought now 14 years longer than anyone in the conference.

NY Giants: If the scrap heap approach at QB actually pays off, then Big Blue could really surprise, but that's a ginormous "if."

NFC NORTH

Green Bay: This team is one more Jordan Love leap forward away from winning it all.

Detroit: With more holes than in recent seasons and two new coordinators and the sudden burden of proof of showing that they can succeed as the hunter rather than the hunted, this is a bit of a stealth regression candidate.

Chicago: Ben Johnson inherits a roster that has grown much stronger over the past two seasons, leaving him room to coach them up to the playoffs.

Minnesota: A greater number of holes converges with the reality that the franchise must justify letting a playoff-caliber QB walk away, setting up a potential setback candidate.

NFC SOUTH

Atlanta: A decent number of holes remain, but if Tampa stubs its toe in the slightest, the Falcons can pounce in football's worst division.

Tampa Bay: We've seen what happens before in terms of Baker Mayfield's ability to handle success and paired with a deteriorating offensive line, that's a dangerous combination for the Bucs.

Carolina: Bryce Young not being a bust anymore is nice – if it lasts – but he's not good enough to carry a still-feeble roster.

New Orleans: The Saints have a more respectable-than-usual top-to-bottom roster, but the worst QB room in the league suggests a tank for the franchise's second-greatest QB's grandson.

LA Rams: The roster remains too top-heavy to return to the Super Bowl, but retaining the championship of a retrenching division is well within reach.

San Francisco: If this line doesn't get Brock Purdy murdered, then the retooling era in San Fran will be brief.

Arizona: If they can block and flash enough weapons in the passing game, then this team has a high ceiling, but that's a big "if."
